Victorian day ushers in new-tech school

A MAGIC-LANTERN show, a penny-farthing bicycle, and a day of Victorian-style lessons marked the remodelling of Wethersfield village school to accommodate an audio visual room and a multipurpose craft and technology room. The £60,000 project, which ran over budget as builders found unexpected problems in incorporating the former headmaster's house into the school itself, means that classes need no longer be held in the playground prefabs. It also means an office for the

headmaster, Mr Arthur Brookes and the school secretary and an upstairs storeroom.

The Governors have long campaigned for this work which follows the suggestions made by parent and governor Andrew Pipe whose architectural skills made excellent use of the old buildings.

Underpinning, re-roofing and exhaustive treatment to timber and walls was involved and a new staircase.

The extensions were opened on Friday, February 21 by the Rt Hon Tony Newton, OBE, the local MP.

Local people get first chance of new homes

ONLY a few days remain in which to apply for a tenancy of one of the four new houses now under construction at Saffron Gardens.

The two-bedroom homes, due for completion in May, are intended for local people currently in need of housing. Applicants should either live or work in Wethersfield or be a member of the family of someone who lives in the parish.

Should there not be enough such applicants people in Great Bardfield, Finchingfield or Shalford would next be considered and after this applicants from Braintree district. The rents, for the assured shorthold tenancies will be about £45 a week.

The homes will not be for sale; they are being managed by the Blackwater Housing Association and Braintree District Council will have a half say in who becomes a tenant when the Housing Association's management committee meets on March 19 to make the allocations.
