Village will not lose its surgery entirely

FEARS among older residents, particularly those without cars, that Wethersfield may lose its doctor's surgery with the centralisation of the Freshford practice at the medical centre now under construction at Finchingfield were allayed this week.

"The surgery here will not close," said Dr Ambross, a senior member of the practice, "But it will have a reduced number of surgeries.

"We hope, however, that most people will want to go to Finchingfield because there will be better facilities there."



A LIGHT ON NORWAY

THERE's a little bit of Norway in Joy Frost's Hereward Way home. From a side table, light sparkles through a lampshade of Hardanger work, with which Joy, a keen needlewoman tackling everything from cross-stitch to tapestry, is particularly pleased.

In the country around Norway's Hardanger fiord the women use the attractive open-work designs for aprons, blouses, bedspreads and traycloths. Originally Hardanger could be any colour so long as it was white; now coloured silks have added lustre to the embroidery.

It takes courage to attack your finished stitching with a pair of scissors, cut the threads of the base material and end up with a delicate pattern of open squares but that is how it has to be done. Cut the holes first and try to work round them and you soon run into problems. Want to try it? Look for ANNA, the Burder knitting and needlework books in the newsagents, for patterns and instructions.



'Give us somewhere that's safe to park'

RESIDENTS of Meadside are afraid to let their cars out of their sight in case of vandalism, one said at the Annual Parish Meeting on April 15.

They claim they are forced to park their vehicles on the grass verge opposite their homes, where they can be seen, despite a notice threatening a £100 fine for parking there.

"The other night someone scratched right across the top of my car," said one owner.

Asked by District Councillor John Finbow if the residents would be prepared to sacrifice part of their gardens for parking places, the reply was: "I wouldn't be prepared to have my car parked where I can't see it". Use of the concrete hard-standing in the area by the garages was ruled out on the same grounds.

One suggestion was to cut away the grass bank in front of Meadside to form parking bays. Mr Finbow agreed to try to

get a meeting with the District Council to discuss the problem on site.

Parking in High Street was also discussed, in view of a long-term proposal to form a pavement on The Dog side of the road to assist pedestrians and children on their way to school.

Some residents thought this could be an extra hazard to drivers approaching the brow of the hill if the road was made narrower and parking was still permitted on both sides. Access for fire and emergency vehicles was also a problem.
