Interested in the future of your village!

Our Parish Council have been considering whether conducting a Village Appraisal would be of benefit to the residents of Wethersfield Parish. The project would be centred around a questionnaire specific to local issues and developed by a Steering Group of villagers representing as many interests and age groups as possible.

The result of the Appraisal would be a report to be used to try and improve at least some of the areas highlighted by the questionnaire.

The Parish Council is keen to participate but would like to find out the level of interest and enthusiasm there is in the Parish for doing this work; particularly for forming the Steering Group.

There is a computer software programme to assist the Steering Group entitled 'Village Appraisals for Windows' If we were to go ahead the appraisal would give every person the opportunity to express their views about the issues that affect them most. This would be a community based initiative. Those that have been carried out have resulted in action to improve life for local people.

The Project comes under the umbrella of the Rural Community Council of Essex and their aim is to improve and enhance the quality of life for those who live in the rural areas of Essex. It encourages self help community projects.

"Why do it?" I hear you say, but there are many reasons for taking part they are listed here:

- •Identify important issues within the village and highlights what needs to be improved or conserved.
- •It gives everyone the chance to be heard.

 As well as opinions it provides statistical evidence therefore strengthening the voice of the community when campaigning on issues.

- It can contribute to the planning process by informing statutory authorities of local views and concerns.
- It allows you to learn more about the village and could identify threats that may be need to be acted on or identify the need and opportunity for new community activities
- •It enables future projects to be planned with the knowledge that the village will support them.
- Through working towards a common goal the village appraisal helps bring groups and individuals in the community together.

So there you have it. If you are interested then in the first instance please let John Sheldrake know as soon as possible. If there is sufficient interest shown by the residents a public meeting will be called to discuss the matters more fully.

As the newsletter reaches most homes this was the best way of testing the waters.

This puts the parish residents in a catch 22 situation. We can hardly complain if things do not get done, the traffic problems, planning etc.

Newsletter needs help!




