

Back to it's Roots

FTER many years of being a village eyesore, the derelict building at the side

of Wethersfield Village Hall has finally been demolished.

The building was originally built for the Raven brewery, about 150 years ago, as a two up, two down cottage for one of the workers at the brewery. The brewing process was such that someone had to live on the job. The brewery was owned by the Maberlys who lived in Hill Foot House, Mrs Maberly maiden name being Raven. There is a pink obelisk in the URC graveyard with many of the Raven family names




engraved on it, but Edith Maude, who died in 1942 is buried in the Parish Churchyard. A Thomas Raven is listed as Wethersfield malster in 1848 and may well have been Edith's father, she being born in 1874. Another Thomas Raven ran the Dog Inn in 1895 - possibly another branch of the family?

Edith gifted what is now the Village hall to the parish in 1922, after the brewery closed down.

The building which is now the Village Hall was used for storing the grain used in the brewing process, the grain-hoist still there at the front of the building and the back room of the hall had a mesh floor for drying the hops - the Oast house 'chimney' being clearly visible in the photo below taken about 1920. The actual brewery, with it's chimney intact may now be seen behind Hill Foot House.

The last tenant of the the cottage lived in it until the 1940's but sadly after that it fell into disrepair until it was bought by a local plumber about 30 years ago who used mainly as a store for his materials.



He was instructed to demolish the chimney, visible in the top photo, which was deemed unsafe. This had originally served two fireplaces, one on each floor.

Some years ago the plumber sought, and was granted, planning permission for it to become a boutique! However, it became dangerously derelict and the police ordered it to be fenced off.

Happily it has finally been purchased by Rob and Elenor Lambert, the current owners of Hill Foot House who are building an annex on the site. Preparation of the site has revealed an old well adjacent to what must have been the kitchen of the old house.

So, having originally been owned by the Maberlys of Hill Foot House, the building has finally gone back to it's roots.


Wethersfield's sons and daughters keep coming 'home' – thanks to the Internet. Latest arrival to tell tales of his happy childhood in the 1940s on the village website) is Edward Bloomfield from Towcester in Northamptonshire.

On the site he writes about riding on the bare backs of the huge Suffolk horses that worked the land at Parsonage farm. Not so easy when you are only three, with tiny infant legs. He remembers being snatched to safety from an angry bull by his mother Muriel who lived at the farm with her brothers Tom and Jack Grimwood, both deceased in recent years.

Muriel's marriage to Sgt Jack Bloomfield united two huge Wethersfield families of the 1930s, the Grimwoods and the Bloomfields of Cherry Tree Gardens on the road to Shalford.

At Wethersfield School Ed gave head teacher Miss Trundle a bit of a problem – she could hardly tell him apart from his cousin David Grimwood. (see picture).

But the boys grew up to lead very different lives. David stayed in Wethersfield to farm at Parsonage and at Tattersalls, Ed moved off to become an engineer. He also followed his Grandad Christopher Grimwood into singing and entertainment. To this he added writing



songs for BBC children's programmes – often about farming in the old days!

Community Initiatives supported by Wethersfield Parish Council

THE Parish Council are pleased to announce that their recent application to the Rural Communities Development Fund for a £5,000 grant towards the cost of improvements to the Wethersfield Playing Field Car Park has been successful. The Parish Council have agreed to match-fund and the shortfall of £1,750 in the £11,750 total estimated cost of the project will be met by donations from local organisations and individuals.


The Parish Council and Playing Field Association would like to thank all those who sent letters of support and those of you who took the trouble to telephone with comments or complete the voting slip included with the last newsletter.

The main works including surfacing are due to commence on May 27th and be complete within 2 weeks. Car park marking and new hedging to front and west side will be carried out later in the year. We are happy to consider alternatives to white lining that may be considered to be more in sympathy with our rural setting (stone coloured studs?).

The project has received the support of over 60 individuals in addition to the following organisations: Parish Council, Parish Church, Parish School, Pre-School, Cricket Club, Gower Trust, Fitch & Mott Educational Foundation, Derek Flannery PFA. However a small number of residents have questioned the need for the project (less than 10% of total response). Other priorities stated by those who were both for

and against the car park project included: Youth facilities (indoor in particular), Improvements to Village Halls and other Community Buildings and traffic calming measures. The Parish Council will consider these and other community issues in forthcoming meetings.

On the subject of traffic calming the Parish Council is at long last able to confirm the installation of sockets to receive a speed indicator device at 3 locations in Wethersfield and 2 in Blackmore End. The device itself will be shared on a rota basis with Finchingfield and Bardfield Parish's.





If successful the Parish Council will consider the possibility of permanent installations, BUT solar powered rather than the currently available system, which is battery operated. Thanks here to Nicky Pearce for agreeing to re-charge the batteries from time to time.

8th August 1926 ~28th March 2008

It is a great privilege for me to be asked to say a few words in Lorna's memory. I first remember seeing Lorna walking by on Sunday afternoon with her parents and brothers and sisters en route from Rotten End to visit her granny who then lived on what is now the Base, and they had to walk home again!

She used to talk about how they had to walk from Rotten End to Shalford School in all weathers, and if they got wet had to sit in damp clothes all day (how things have changed) the only let off from school was if the river flooded and they couldn't get through, she said

we enjoyed those days off!

On leaving school at 14 she went to work for Mrs Wortley at Park Farm Rayne and then Kelvedon. She then had a short spell at Warner's silk factory in Braintree, then moved on to work as a nanny to Dr Wright's 3 children at Panfield Lane, as the children grew up Lorna became more and more involved with reception work in the surgery and ended up as a receptionist at the Group Surgery at Blythe Meadow from which she retired at 62. Two of those children came to her funeral.

Lorna obviously learned to enjoy walking because we all remember her on her daily walks through the village, calling in on friends, stopping to have a word with people she met. Lorna loved people and was interested in them and did untold kindnesses for many she was utterly reliable, a wonderful friend a great help and support to many. A rock

for her family.

She didn't have to be asked the offer was always there. She enjoyed taking part in village activities; clubs, coffee mornings, rummage sales, bus trips, holidays and was a loyal member of the Church. She distributed the Wethersfield News for many years. We miss her so much in so many ways. She was a generous supporter of Children's Charities and was always busy knitting goods for sale in a Charity Shop.

Lastly the way she dealt with her tragic illness was an example to us all, she accepted her situation with grace and serenity and those that visited her in her final days came away uplifted by her dignity. WETHERSFIELD Pavilion was faced with a mouse problem at the beginning of February.
The Pest Control and Environmental Health

The Pest Control and Environmental Health Departments of Braintree District Council visited the premises and advised that the pavilion building was not fit for purpose by the preschool or any organisations, due to the fact that the mice were contaminating the building and the equipment inside. The premises also needed to be brought up to scratch (!) in areas which were not up to the standard required.

Over the next couple of weeks to follow, the Pest

Control Dept made several visits to the premises laying poison bate boxes down to bring the mouse population under control. The Pavilion also undertook a refurbishment, with the help of some very dedicated volunteers from the PFA, Pre-school and cricket club and others, the Pavilion received a new vinyl safety flooring to its main areas, replacement shatterproof lights, installation of a new heater and relocation of thermostats, replacement shelving and improvement to kitchen cupboards and a good old lick of paint.

During the period that the Pavilion building was not fit for purpose (approx 3 weeks) the Pre-school was unable to open for part of the duration but then operated at the Village hall for 4 days - only after a whole new registration with Ofsted including a through inspection of the premises and some stressful form filling had

been carried out!

Towards the end of February, the mouse infestation was contained and the refurbishment work all completed. The Environmental Health Dept were called back and gave the premises the green light to re-open to its users!

A big well done to those involved in getting the Pavilion refurbished and re-

opened so quickly.

BOGUS CALLER TOP 10

I am often being asked to list the most popular methods being used by burglars to "con" their way into people's homes. The following are the most common but remember this list is NOT exhaustive. So please be cautious when dealing with someone on the doorstep who you do not know.

Water Board/Water related:

These make over 50% of all reported distraction burglary crimes. They consist of "problem further down the road", "leak in neighbour's home", "water quality check" etc.

Council worker:

"To carry out repair work and check radiators" etc...
Police:

Purporting to be a Police Officer investigating crime where a suspect has been apprehended and has indicated your house as being one that he had burgled. Also linked with Neighbourhood Watch Co-ordinator, wanting to advise on recent crimes in the area.

Lost ball/Lost dog.:

Relies on a person at the door convincing the victim that a dog, cat or ball has been lost in garden., and encouraging the victim to help them search. A second person then slips in and searches property.

Requiring pen/paper.

Person/persons at door, asks the victim to provide pen and paper to allow them to leave a note for relative/friend who lives nearby and is not at home. Usually burglars involve the victim in composing the note, leaving time for an accomplice to search property.

Asking for drink.

Involves person knocking and asking for a drink, and complaining of not feeling well. While victim is getting water the person steals something close to hand, often purse from handbag etc.

Electricity Board.

Often claim to need access to property following a power cut in area to check electrical appliances. The other is access required for meter reading.



Going Out.

Now that the warmer weather is approaching and also holidays are appearing on the horizon, it is worth taking a few sensible precautions to prevent unwelcome visitors into your home. Make sure that the ground floor windows are securely closed and doors, including shed and garage, are locked when you go out. Ideally, your doors should be fitted with a mortice lock and a cylinder rim mounted lock, while closed windows fitted with window locks are an effective deterrent. Always keep your keys in a safe place and do not leave them in the locks or lying around. If you are out for the evening, draw the curtains and leave a room light on (not the hall) and perhaps put on the radio. If you are going on holiday, don't forget to cancel the milk, newspapers etc. Don't close the curtains as they are a giveaway, especially during the day. Do not display your home address on the outside of your luggage. Finally, ask a friend or neighbour to keep an eye on your home for you. After all this is one of the reasons for being a member of Neighbourhood Watch



UPGRADING SECURITY OF DOMESTIC GLAZING.

I thought it was a good idea to bring to your attention, in future editions, security products which you may not be aware of. For this issue I would like to begin with window security film. While advising people on home or commercial building security I often hear the comment, "It doesn't matter how good the door and windows locks are they can just come through glass". Ground floor and accessible first floor windows are vulnerable to burglars targeting easy access and will often break glass to get to window catches or locks, and sometimes, but not often climb in through the broken glass.

So applying a permanent clear window security film onto existing panes can reap genuine rewards, being demonstratively more practical and cost-effective compared with installing toughened or even laminated glass.

Developed 40 years ago in London for defending vulnerable premises against bomb blast, film proved itself instantly capable of obstructing unauthorised entry though existing windows and, with 90% of enhanced impact resistance delivered within hours of fitting, treating existing flat glass properly compares most favourably with full window replacement. Security film is NOT invisible steel. Glass struck hard or often enough inevitably cracks, but our "would be burglar" will waste valuable time and effort attempting to force their way through the film.

There are local companies who carry out this work, with staff and surveyors conversant with high technology security film and can assess needs and recommend suitable materials. 25% to over 40 members.


The cost of staging our shows is not insignificant and increases year on year. For example, our expenses to stage Fiddler on the Roof totalled nearly £5,200. To buy the rights to put on the show from the copyright owners cost nearly £1,200 alone! Added to this we have the hire of the Village Hall (both for rehearsal and performance), insurance, audio equipment and lighting hire etc. it soon adds up! We rely on subscriptions from our membership, ticket sales, sponsorship, and the generosity of a great many volunteers to cover our costs and we would like to thank everyone who has supported us this year.

In cooperation with the Village Hall, WAP has extended the stage and purchased new stage curtains, all fitted in time for the March production. Our contribution to these improvements was funded from our fund raising events.

WAP's next production in March 2009 will be Return to the Forbidden Planet with auditions in September. This show won the 1990 Olivier Award for Best Musical and is based partially on Shakespeare's Tempest but it will have you literally dancing in the aisles being packed with 50's & 60's rock 'n' roll foot tapping classics such as; Great Balls of Fire, Good Vibrations, Teenager in Love, She's Not There, Shaking All Over, The Monster Mash and many more!

The father of Ken Tarbin of West Drive, Wethersfield, very bravely tried to rescue the trapped airman from the burning Fortress aircraft in spite of the great risk from explosives. . Relatives of the crew are coming from America for the ceremony and at 2.45 in Shalford Village Hall there are to be photos, a film and other events. All welcome.
